2012 Summit Overview


- Tenth Anniversary Summit
- Hosted by The Evergreen State College
- Registered 515 students from 35 schools across five counties
- Three main parts to the day
 - Keynote speech, "Precious Knowledge" viewing, and Group Discussion led by Sean Arce of Tucson Unified School District
 - Students met with local employers and colleges during lunch
 - Four workshops covering college and financial aid applications, apprenticeships, and health careers
- We surveyed students at time of registration to collect demographic data and responses to pre-summit questions
- We administered a survey after the summit to collect aspirational data and summit feedback






Pre-Survey Data Summary

- Five counties represented with Thurston providing the most (214) and Pacific providing the fewest (1)
- Returning and first time participants*
 - Winlock Apollo, Ridgeline, Ocosta, N.
 Mason, CHOICE, and Yelm notable for 100% first time participants
 - Shelton and Rochester notable for more than 50% returning participants
 - Centralia, Aberdeen, N. Thurston, Olympia, Winlock, and Timberline were notable for <50% returning participants
 - Overall, 48% were first-time participants









Pre-Survey Data summary

- Grade distribution of participants was weighted slightly toward sophomores with seniors barely having the fewest
- Demographics of participants
 - Near-equal distribution of 15, 16, 17 year-olds;
 12% overall were 18-20 year-olds
 - 53% female, 47% male
 - 96% self-identify as Hispanic, 2% as non-Hispanic
 - 49% of participants were first-generation Latino





Post-Survey Data Summary

- 58% of respondents felt the Summit provided encouragement and hope that college is possible
- 42% obtained specific information about resources to make a better plan for further education
- 23% developed new ideas about the trades and apprenticeships






Post-Survey Data Summary

- Student were asked which components of the Summit were "most helpful"
 - 72%: How to Apply for College
 - 63%: Value of studying Latino culture
 - 56%: College and university tables
 - 36%: How to Apply for Financial Aid

• Students saw the greatest barrier to planning their futures as

- 61%: Lack of money
- 37%: Lack of information about what to do next
- 27%: Have support and nothing is holding them back
- Post-high school plans show
 - Nearly as many were uncertain of their success as were researching college
 - Almost one-fourth wanted a plan or are unsure
 - 10-12% were planning to work full time
 - Almost 10% were planning to join the military
 - Less than 4% have applied to college (~24% were seniors)

Post-Survey Data Summary

- Sampling of comments about *Precious Knowledge*
 - It made my heart open more and understand myself, too
 - It was diagnosed with diabetes and thought my life was not worth it anymore... That video changes my thoughts about everything.
 - This film gave me motivation started a voice in my head that said, "You can do it. You can succeed. You are Latina."
 - Education is the great equalizer for society.
- After viewing *Precious Knowledge*
 - 63% were encouraged to learn more about their culture, history, and current leaders
 - 34% felt motivated to start diversity clubs or classes at their schools

Students are seeking cultural direction





Recommendations

- Determine ways to engage more students in Pacific County
- Consider surveying non-returning attendees at schools with fewer than 50% returning students
- Engage more closely with Olympia/Tumwater building administrations to improve attendance
- Evaluate workshop offerings based on age and grade distributions (e.g., Make Applying to College/Financial Aid compulsory for Juniors)
- Look for opportunities to provide support and direction to students throughout academic year
